

MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAIR AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Throughout the challenging times of 2020, our mission remained strong: WCF is the steward of money gifted to the community and provides grants in the areas of environment, arts & culture, social service and education. Our vision is to be impactful in supporting the charities and organizations that address evolving community needs. And in a year like no other, community needs evolved at a lightning-fast pace.

The pandemic highlighted pre-existing inequities in housing, safety, food security, and employment. We became rooted in our commitment to recover by hosting the Stay at Home Gala Fundraiser and providing \$89,545.00 from the WCF Emergency Fund to local charities. We were further able to provide support by partnering with Community Foundations of Canada and the Government of Canada to deliver \$70,000 of Emergency Community Support Funding (ECSF) in Whistler and Pemberton area. We are grateful to the local charities who have worked incredibly hard to support populations experiencing heightened vulnerability during this crisis.

By working across all sectors—public, private and philanthropic, we were able to provide much more support than we would have achieved on our own. Together with the committed, passionate donors, community leaders and charities, we are addressing evolving community needs and making both a present-day impact as well as building a safety net for the future.

This year's annual report highlights how we continued to provide stability and flexible granting for our local charities in order for important work to be done. The more opportunities we can create to remove barriers or encourage connection, the stronger our community will be. And at the Whistler Community Foundation, we strive to do that through our grant programs and Vital Signs projects. On behalf of the board, I would like to express our sincere gratitude to all those who are part of the Whistler Community Foundation – donors, committee volunteers and staff are all a part of our impact. Our interconnectedness and interdependence have never been more important. Thank you for all that you do to support and build our community!



2020 PROGRAMS

Whistler's Vital Signs



VITAL CAFE

In a continuation of the popular Vital Cafes from earlier years, Whistler's Vital Signs hosted a Climate Change conversation in January 2020 that was jam-packed with people exchanging ideas while elbow to elbow. And in October 2020, we held our first online Vital Cafe. Despite the pandemic-induced virtual meeting fatigue we were experiencing, people of all ages and communities turned out for this vital conversation entitled Youth: Good Health and Wellbeing in Whistler. Participants were asked a broader question of "Why does it matter?" before reaching into the subjects of mental health, local resources, and youth engagement (for resident and seasonal folk). Smaller groups formed and explored ways: to include youth at the decision-making level; to reduce stigma around asking for help; and, to reduce poverty as a tool for better outcomes.

A VITAL EXPLORATION: SEA TO SKY & HOWE SOUND REGION

In an exciting collaboration, community foundations in the Sea-to-Sky and Howe Sound region designed a vital report that harnessed the most compelling data comparisons for Whistler, Squamish, Bowen Island, Sunshine Coast, and West Vancouver/North Shore. From the report, readers can find greater clarity in the distinct community needs in a region that is often clumped together in Provincial budgets, healthcare, childcare, education, transportation and more.



Nonprofit Network

It was a challenging year for local nonprofits, so we continued to meet (online, of course) in hopes of providing continuity and stability that we had gained from previous years. Community Foundations in the Sea-to-Sky region recognized the need to develop new skills to better meet the needs of our communities that were facing new challenges with the pandemic. With that came a collaboration that would bring charities in the region together in an online learning series featuring subject matter experts who focused on topics like building capacity, fundraising, organizational assessment, and financial impact management.



Responsive Neighbourhood Small Grants

Responsive Neighbourhood Small Grants (R-NSG) were back in 2020. Well, technically. The word responsive was added to make note of the programing changes that included guidelines for physical distancing. Whistler Community Foundation was pleased to support 11 ideas that connected people socially to share workload, skills or talents with one another. Our community projects varied and included a virtual creative writing workshop with local author Rebecca Wood Barrett, arts and crafts project kits distributed to your door, online meditation and mindfulness groups and the construction of mini-libraries in a neighbourhood—or two. On Saturday, November 28 my son Jonathan helped me install the Alta Lake Book Exchange. Later that day, I ran into an old friend admiring the newly installed structure. I hadn't seen Jim in over thirty years but had heard he'd recently bought a house just down the road. The book exchange was already fulfilling its role as a neighbourhood meeting place!

2020 GRANT STORIES

Community

Every Sunday, The Point Artist-run Centre invites artists into their creative space to work on personal or professional projects. Really, anyone wishing to express themselves through art is welcome to paint, act, sing, sketch, write, dance, play music, or simply dream up something new. The \$2750 community grant is used to reduce the cost of entry and reduce barriers. Many famous local artists, writers, painters, musicians are known to host the events for a chance to mentor and engage new members in creative work.

A Emergency

Squamish Lil'wat Cultural Centre's (SLCC) Indigenous staff have been sharing their culture and language with visitors at the centre for a number of years. And the Indigenous Youth Ambassador (IYA) program brings experience and knowledge to Squamish and Lil'wat youth through employment in all areas of the centre from the restaurant to hosting crafting activities. With the arrival of the pandemic, SLCC recognized the need to encourage mental wellness within the team to ensure staff could expand their capacity to deal with the pressures of work and commuting while supporting and protecting one another, community members, Knowledge Keepers and Elders. A grant from the Emergency Fund supplied funds for programming and services that would make the workplace a place to find support in the journey toward mental wellness.







Inventory, Control & Monitoring are three words that bring a less than inspiring response to most, but when you see what is happening out in the field it is truly motivating. In 2020, Sea to Sky Invasive Species Council used Environmental Legacy Fund grants totaling \$43,000 to tackle invasive plants and animals through best practice management and public education. Maintaining biodiversity is at the core of what the council focuses on with a mindset toward protection (e.g. soils, wildlife, and watersheds) and prevention (e.g. soil erosion, toxic hazards, and even agricultural crop failures).

Learning

LIZI MCLOUGHLIN

Because many of us know Lizi McLoughlin to be helpful, knowledgeable and ready to take on a challenge, it's hard to imagine her nervous at the prospect of taking on a newer and bigger role at Zero Ceiling. But she admits, she was tentative until she gained more skills through education.

In late 2017, Lizi started working just two days per week with the Whistler charity that is focused on ending youth homelessness. At that point, Lizi had a lesser-defined position that included a host of activities — a bit of marketing, programming, admin and development. But in 2018, with two motivated and talented executive directors in the lead, Zero Ceiling bolstered its strategic direction with their sights set on organizational development, capacity building and stabilized funding.

With this direction, Lizi — who is experienced in project management for non-profits and high-school teaching — tackled program management and organizational development in a coordinator type role. As the programming team expanded, Lizi began to focus on development. And she enjoyed connecting Zero Ceiling's bigger picture with what the rest of the province and community was up to.

Lizi has played such an integral role in Zero Ceiling's growth over the last four years. We are so excited that she has taken on the role of Development Manager. She is an innovator, a community builder, and has a passionate heart and open mind. She is skillfully leading our development strategy and is bringing to our work, a focus on equity in fundraising and philanthropy.

In 2020, Lizi applied for a Kathy Barnett Leadership grant. Due to the practical nature, Vantage Point's Essentials for New Managers and Conflict and Challenging Conversations set Lizi up for the next step – a promotion to Development Manager. And at Lighthouse Visionary Strategies' Mentor Program, Lizi was connected to local business professionals and entrepreneurs where she "valued the chance to share ideas and learn from their experiences".

Lizi has now taken on revenue budgeting and fundraising and communications strategy. Plus, Zero Ceiling hired an office administrator who reports directly to Lizi which gives her a chance to hone her new skills on delegation and team performance. The advantage in learning new things in Lizi's mind was the opening of team capacity. "We can't keep operating like a tiny organization when we're growing so quickly," she remarked.

With Lizi in management, the recent team development and new adventures into housing with the provincial government, the organization is more robust with clearly defined roles and better balanced workloads than ever before. And with true dedication, Lizi expressed motivation to give the co-executive directors plenty of space to focus on high-level conversations that move the organization and the Zero Ceiling family forward.
