Tourism, a key economic sector in Whistler, lost visitors due to health protocols and restrictions causing record-breaking financial losses for employees and employers.

Mental and physical health has suffered due to:

- elective surgery cancellations
- increased severity in diagnoses of lifelimiting illness resulting from residents staying away from health facilities
- COVID-19 illness
- burnout and decreased sense of vitality
- financial stress
- restrictions barring gathering, particularly affected elderly, parents of young children and teens

Lil'wat Cultural Centre (SLCC) & RMOW's Parks and Recreation facilities were forced to close or severely modify their programing. Increase in calls requiring mobilization
